


A A reading from Revelation:

CHILDREN'S MESSAGE

SERMON: Pastor Dwight Hanson – <u>The Holy City</u>

6th Sunday of Easter; 5/25/2025; Grace Lutheran Church; Pastor Dwight Hanson Acts 16:9-15; Psalm 67; Revelation 21:9-14,21-27; John 16:23-33

Children's message: In today's first lesson from the Bible, the Apostle Paul was in a city where he had never been. He wanted to visit people who worshiped God, but there was no regular meeting place. Do you know where he looked? By the local river (Acts 16:13). Why? Because the water of life is behind the story of life, from Genesis to the last book of the Bible. In the 23rd Psalm, where does God, the Shepherd, lead the sheep to calm them down? By the waters. Who might want sheep not to be calm, but running every which way, exhausted and easily influenced? One of the most important things that you can know as a child of the Heavenly Father is how to quiet yourself and pray. God listens, and answers, perhaps not always as we ask, but as we need. Jesus will lead you all your days. There will be times of challenge. There will be times of refreshment. Just keep following him. Make time for a quiet, prayerful heart. God will lead the way. Let's pray...

The Holy City

Grace to you and peace from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen. The Book of Revelation can be extremely difficult, and needs to be handled with great care. Over the centuries, the final book of the Bible has been bound up with some questionable endeavors. *But when used well*, it has proven itself, again and again, often making its way to graveside gatherings of the bereft, who need a Word from beyond this broken world.

Even just for everyday living, the words have come through in the clutch for Christians going through difficult times. Above the clamor of fallen existence comes the call of God to persevere, one step at a time, behind the Victorious Lamb. There's a promise that cannot be taken away, only squandered away, if we do not listen. Here's Jesus, from today's Gospel, "*In the world you will have tribulation*. *But take heart; I have overcome the world*" (16:33b).

God's promise, full of everlasting hope, comes down from Heaven. It has been received by the faithful of every generation, aware of their need for renewal, longing for the gracious goodness of God to win the day, beginning in their very own hearts and minds.

Our call, therefore, is to pay close attention, resist the urge to twist ideas more to our liking, and simply allow the inspired words to speak. Then we will find a perfect message for Memorial Day weekend, on the Sixth Sunday of Easter. Let's take it a little at a time. You may find it helpful to follow along in your bulletin. Revelation, chapter 21, beginning with verse 9:

⁹ Then came one of the seven angels who had the seven bowls full of the seven last plagues and spoke to me, saying, "Come, I will show you the Bride, the wife of the Lamb."

Right from the start, the words are filled with mysterious, seemingly contradictory images. An angel, with a bowl full of gloom-and-doom "plagues" for the judgement of the world, points to the beautifully perfect "Bride," "the wife of the Lamb." How does this hold together? One thing is sure. The Lord got the Apostle John's attention, and through his testimony, we are paying attention, too. By the time we're done with this reading, matters should be clear enough.

Slowly, we come to understand that the judgement of God *is in service of* the <u>holiness</u> of God. He will make sure that there's genuine hope again. What kind of hope would it be if God just put a stamp of approval on the corruptions of this fallen world? And what foul corruption has the human mind not come up with, nudged by the Tempter? The Holy One is no accessory to a crime against the goodness of his own creation. He does not wink at the twisting of his will.

But neither has he given up on us. Quite the opposite. He laid down his very life for us, then took it up again in power, glory, and dominion. The confusing imagery serves to make something crystal clear. The beauty of the "Bride" is in complete relation to the sovereignty of "the Lamb." The victorious "Lamb" is the one who creates the beauty in the first place. He makes people clean by the power of his own self-sacrifice.

"The holy city," those words, put together, haven't always spoken to me. We've got at least one New Yorker in the congregation, and Sinatra sang a thrilling tribute. But I've never been fully convinced. I grew up seeing the Bible as a country book, as in nature, with seasons of growth producing wheat, fruit, and little calves leaping in the sunshine. And for the most part, the Bible, itself, portrayed cities as places of sin and trouble, which came as no surprise to me. After all, the very first city was founded by Cain after he finished off his brother (Gen. 4:17). Even Jonah, forced to visit Ninevah, camped outside the city limits (4:5). A good spot to pout. IMAGINE MY SHOCK, then, when it dawned on me that the ultimate imagery of God's redemption was in the form of...a city! Of course, it turns out that it's not just any city, but "*the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven*...." I do "want to be a part of" *that* version. One Bible teacher said of the city that it's "the realization of human community, the concrete living out of interdependence," where "the beauty of life is not a solo but a symphony" (E. Boring, pg. 219, <u>Revelation</u>; John Knox Press). Facts are facts. And the crowd before God's throne will be too big to count, from every tribe and nation (Rev. 7:9).

This may come as a shock to those of us who like to "get away from it all," meaning the company of ducks and perhaps a cautious loon. *But what if there was no more reason to "get away from it all"*? What if the terrible part of life could be removed? What if only the blessing remained, and we could see each other and treat each other as God intended? What if people were healthy, faithful, honest, gentle, deferential, and humble in the awareness of the error of their own ways? That's quite a different picture! It may be a rare find in this world. But that's all there will be in the holy city to come.

Here's a helpful quote from a Bible teacher: "You cannot enter the holy city without being reminded of the revelation of God which came through Israel" (Lynn H. Hough, pg. 534, <u>The Interpreter's Bible</u>; Vol. 12). The <u>full</u> biblical legacy must be understood. Abraham and Sarah learned to live by faith, holding fast to the promise and goodness of God. Through the legacy of Abraham and Sarah, God's blessing pours forth, like living water, onto the families of the whole world (Gen. 12:1-3).

The mission was always bigger than a mere plot of land in a terribly troubled region. It's about hearts, minds, and souls getting right with God, not by virtue of earning, taking, or controlling, but by the simple, profound power of trusting the will and Word of the Lord above all else, right in the middle of it all. This is the source of genuine peace, the wholistic sense of *shalom*.

Through the gates of the Old Testament, into the promise of the New Testament, with the whole structure built on the foundation of the apostolic witness. This is why we hold to Scripture as we do. For it carries to each generation the sacred testimony of the Law, Prophets, *and* Apostles. It's the whole message. There's a definite beginning, a flash of holy light (Gen. 1:3). Then the shadows of sin crept in, like a serpent, leaving behind misery and distress. But God's will was resolute, that the creation, so good at its founding, would not be forfeited. Some battles are just. And all who humbly follow "the Lamb" will know, in their hearts, what Heaven's victory really looks like.

Our Wednesday study just finished the book of Ezekiel. God gave the prophet a vision of Jerusalem renewed, even way back when. Do you know the very last line of Ezekiel's testimony? "*And the name of the city henceforth shall be, The Lord is there*" (Ezek. 48:35b; RSV).

It's true that back in Ezekiel's day, the holy city couldn't even be understood without reference to the temple. But what if time moved forward, and God's plan moved forward, and Israel's mission was fulfilled by a perfect, divine "lamb" arriving from Heaven? What if he gave himself as a sacrifice on behalf of those who could not purify themselves (Hebrews 10:12)? That's why there's no temple in the *new* Jerusalem. There will be no need. The names above the gates are still honored. And the testimony of God's ongoing Word becomes the foundation of the Apostles, upon which all else is built.

^{27a} But nothing unclean will ever enter it, nor anyone who does what is detestable or false,

This brings us full circle. For if we have read through Revelation, we realize that a great contrast has been drawn. Yes, there's a perfect city, illuminated by the glory of the Lamb, called a "Bride." But go back to chapter 17, where the Apostle John was summoned just as he was in today's reading. There, too, he would behold a city, but an utterly corrupt one, in which there was no perfect bride.

"Then one of the seven angels who had the seven bowls came and said to me, 'Come, I will show you the judgment of the great harlot..." (Rev. 17:1a). "The woman was arrayed in purple and scarlet, and bedecked with gold and jewels and pearls, holding in her hand a gold cup full of abominations...and on her forehead was written a name of mystery: 'Babylon the great, mother of harlots and of earth's abominations.' And I saw the woman, drunk with the blood of the saints and the blood of the martyrs of Jesus" (Rev. 17:4-6). Every scholar I have read has concluded that "Babylon" is code for ancient Rome, where Nero murdered both Peter and Paul, among others. But this desolation will not abide. For another angel comes announcing that "*Fallen, fallen is Babylon the great!*" (18:2b).

The one, holy God will not allow evil to win! Only what is good and true will remain. But that leaves us with a question: What if we have not been, and are not now, perfect? And what about 1 John 1:8? "*If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us.*" Are we simply left out of God's perfect abiding place? Furthermore, honesty demands an acknowledgement that we, too, have "*fallen short of the glory of God*" (Rom. 3:23). In what way, then, is this final book hopeful? For that, we must finish verse 27.

^{27b} but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life. Notice that it's "*the Lamb's book of life*." The story contained within this book will include the names of the humbly forgiven, who bow before the majesty of God's Son, who took your sin, all your failings, upon himself, for no other reason than that he loves you and does not want evil to destroy you. "*These are they who have come out of the great tribulation; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb*" (Rev. 7:14b).

On this Memorial Day weekend, we have a lot to ponder and remember, from loved ones laid to rest, to those who deserve to be honored for the sacrificial heroism of their earthly lives. Let's also remember to look forward in faith to a time when there will be no more wars, not even rumors of them. For Jesus told us to "*take heart; I have overcome the world*" (16:33b). Thanks be to God. Amen.

Ask and You Will Receive

Find the 33 bold words from John 16:23-28 (ESV)

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In that day you will ask nothing of me. **Truly**, truly, I say to you, **whatever you ask** of the **Father** in my **name**, he will **give** it to you. **Until now** you have **asked nothing** in my name. Ask, and you will **receive**, that your **joy** may be **full**. I have said these things to you in **figures** of **speech**. The **hour** is coming when I will no longer **speak** to you in figures of speech but will **tell** you **plainly** about the Father. In that day you will ask in my name, and I do not say to you that I will ask the Father on **your behalf**; for the Father **himself loves** you, because you have loved me and have **believed** that I **came from God**. I came from the Father and have **come into** the **world**, and now I am **leaving** the world and **going** to the Father.

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
