

FIRST LESSON: Exodus 3:1-15

A A reading from Exodus:

¹Now Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law, Jethro, the priest of Midian, and he led his flock to the west side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. ²And the angel of the LORD appeared to him in a flame of fire out of the midst of a bush. He looked, and behold, the bush was burning, yet it was not consumed. 3And Moses said, "I will turn aside to see this great sight, why the bush is not burned." 4When the LORD saw that he turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." 5Then he said, "Do not come near; take your sandals off your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." 6And he said, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God. 7Then the LORD said, "I have surely seen the affliction of my people who are in Egypt and have heard their cry because of their taskmasters. I know their sufferings, ⁸and I have come down to deliver them out of the hand of the Egyptians and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey, to the place of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. 9And now, behold, the cry of the people of Israel has come to me, and I have also seen the oppression with which the Egyptians oppress them. ¹⁰Come, I will send you to Pharaoh that you may bring my people, the children of Israel, out of Egypt." 11But Moses said to God, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh and bring the children of Israel out of Egypt?" 12He said, "But I will be with you, and this shall be the sign for you, that I have sent you: when you have brought the people out of Egypt, you shall serve God on this mountain." 13Then Moses said to God, "If I come to the people of Israel and say to them, 'The God of your fathers has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" 14God said to Moses, "I am who I am." And he said, "Say this to the people of Israel: 'I am has sent me to you." ¹⁵God also said to Moses, "Say this to the people of Israel: 'The LORD, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you.' This is my name forever, and thus I am to be remembered throughout all generations."

SECOND LESSON: 2 Thessalonians 2:1-8, 13-17

A A Reading from 2 Thessalonians:

¹Now concerning the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our being gathered together to him, we ask you, brothers, ²not to be quickly shaken in mind or alarmed, either by a spirit or a spoken word, or a letter seeming to be from us, to the effect that the day of the Lord has come. ³Let no one deceive you in any way. For that day will not come, unless the rebellion comes first, and the man of lawlessness is revealed, the son of destruction, ⁴who opposes and exalts himself against every so-called god or object of worship, so that he takes his seat in the temple of God, proclaiming himself to be God. ⁵Do you not remember that when I was still with you I told you these things? ⁶And you know what is restraining him now so that he may be revealed in his time. ¬For the mystery of lawlessness is already at work. Only he who now restrains it will do so until he is out of the way. ⁶And then the lawless one will be revealed, whom the Lord Jesus will kill with the breath of his mouth and bring to nothing by the appearance of his coming.

¹³But we ought always to give thanks to God for you, brothers beloved by the Lord, because God chose you as the firstfruits to be saved, through sanctification by the Spirit and belief in the truth. ¹⁴To this he called you through our gospel, so that you may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. ¹⁵So then, brothers, stand firm and hold to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by our spoken word or by our letter. ¹⁶Now may our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God our Father, who loved us and gave us eternal comfort and good hope through grace, ¹⁷comfort your hearts and establish them in every good work and word.



*GOSPEL: Luke 20:27-40

P The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, the twentieth chapter.



²⁷There came to him some Sadducees, those who deny that there is a resurrection, ²⁸and they asked him a question, saying, "Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies, having a wife but no children, the man must take the widow and raise up offspring for his brother. ²⁹Now there were seven brothers. The first took a wife, and died without children. ³⁰And the second ³¹and the third took her, and likewise all seven left no children and died. ³²Afterward the woman also died. ³³In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will the woman be? For the seven had her as wife." ³⁴And Jesus said to them, "The sons of this age marry and are given in marriage, ³⁵but those who

are considered worthy to attain to that age and to the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage, ³⁶for they cannot die anymore, because they are equal to angels and are sons of God, being sons of the resurrection. ³⁷But that the dead are raised, even Moses showed, in the passage about the bush, where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham and the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. ³⁸Now he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for all live to him." ³⁹Then some of the scribes answered, "Teacher, you have spoken well." ⁴⁰For they no longer dared to ask him any question.

CHILDREN'S MESSAGE

SERMON: Pastor Dwight Hanson: <u>Tradition</u>

22nd Sunday after Pentecost; 11/9/2025; Grace Lutheran Church; Pastor Dwight Hanson (Call to worship: Psalm 100); Exodus 3:1-15; Psalm 148; 2 Thess. 2:1-8, 13-17; Luke 20:27-40

Children's message: We're going to talk about thankfulness—(conversation with the kids...)— and then we're going to put it into practice. Let's pray...

Tradition

Grace to you and peace from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen. In an age of innovation, *tradition* is often seen as a bad word, representing all that's stuffy, old, and binding. To the extent that it seems to be holding things back, tradition may even seem downright un-American! Or to quote auto-maker Henry Ford: "I wouldn't give a nickel for all the history in the world." "It is tradition. We want to live in the present..." (Quoted in The Great Thoughts; George Seldes). To him, tradition was like a stop sign, slowing down progress. Or it was like gazing in the rear-view-mirror, dwelling on where we've been. He saw a windshield—forward.

On the other hand, in a more positive light, tradition may function like a map generated by brave souls who already traveled much of the rough terrain before us. They were so thoughtful that they left warnings, encouragements, and practices to help us find a good path in a world of dead-ends and dangers. In other words, if we may mix our metaphors, we don't want to throw out the baby with the bathwater. Healthy, faithful discernment of the ways of life, passed down through the centuries, calls for thoughtfulness born of the presence of the Holy Spirit.

Which brings us to a clarification: The word "tradition" is not even the ultimate topic under consideration. It's about whether what the tradition has conveyed is true to the heart of the matter. An error, passed along just because it's always been that way, is more like the transmission of an infection. So, it makes a difference what kind of tradition we're talking about, the wisdom of it. I recall a quote by a theologian who distinguished between "tradition" as a living thing, and "traditionalism" as a dead thing (Jaraslov Pelikan).

What does it mean for Christians to be "traditionally-grounded" in the best sense of the word? St. Paul in our second lesson: "So then, brothers, stand firm and hold to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by our spoken word or by our letter" (2 Thess. 2:15). A close examination of the whole passage reveals that the apostle was seeking to reassure fellow Christians who were unnecessarily "shaken in mind," as verse 2 put it. Paul was reminding them that when he was with them, he had given very clear teaching about the return of the Lord. They were to go

about their lives, productively, faithfully, in confidence that Jesus will return at a time of his own choosing, and therefore they were simply to serve him with the time they'd been given. Though God's adversary will attempt to grab sovereignty, full of "lawlessness," this rebellion will be ultimately thwarted (2 Thess. 2:3). Christ is Lord! Praise the Lord (Psalm 148)!

Is that not clear, Paul was saying. But along came some spiritual agitators, who wouldn't leave it alone. They unsettled the hearts and minds of God's people. So, in this case, what was on the line was a battle over the truth of the end of all things, and how we are to live in the light of it. Yet, the matter had already been addressed—faithful tradition.

St. Paul had to do something similar for the Corinthian Christians, *remind* them of clearly-stated truths that rose to the level of "first importance."

1 Corinthians 15: ¹ Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand, ² and by which you are being saved, if you hold fast to the word I preached to you—unless you believed in vain. ³ For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁴ that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures.... (1 Cor. 15:1-4).

These were truths "delivered" and "received" from redeemed person to redeemed person, faithful, living tradition. Jesus died for our sins and rose from the dead. Nothing can separate us from the love of Christ. "Hold fast" to the deep truths. Live in the light of them. Don't get lost in the fallen pursuits of worldliness.

And yet, at the same time, understand that faithfulness on earth is to be lived out in the real world, according to this created order, without looking for some false, premature, escape hatch. Paul had already laid this out for them in chapter four of his *first* letter to them, encouraging them to continue to do their earthly work, diligently, and for the young to get married, and be faithful in it. He also told them that they need not worry about those who died before the return of Jesus, that there would be a great reunion one day, and that the victory of Christ will encompass the living and the dead (1 Thess. 4:17). "Therefore comfort one another with these words" (1 Thess. 4:18; RSV). It's part of the authentic Christian tradition that we fully invest in our various vocations on earth, seeking to make life better in love for others, while at the same time being fully aware of our heavenly citizenship, even as we await the arrival of our Savior (Philippians 3:20).

Jesus will return when Jesus will return. Look for it, and know that it's coming. But leave the rest of it to him. Our concern is to pass along the matters of "first importance," and to carry ourselves with the honor of our sacred callings.

It's important that we underline the fact that St. Paul really did understand the distinction we've been making regarding "tradition." The course of his life had turned on this very point! Ironically, he who affirmed the value of tradition was often accused by some of being too much of an innovator. Paul had to defend himself, and clarify.

Listen to what he wrote to the Galatians: ¹³ For you have heard of my former life in Judaism, how I persecuted the church of God violently and tried to destroy it. ¹⁴ And I was advancing in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people, so extremely zealous was I for the traditions of my fathers (Galatians 1:13-14; ESV). Do you think the man who made that mistake, and confessed it before the whole world, didn't distinguish between the traditions of ultimate truth and mere traditionalism handed down?

The Law and the Prophets do bear witness to Christ (Rom. 3:21). There's a centuries-old legacy of a beautiful plan of God-given continuity. We must be students of the whole Bible. There's no legitimate shortcut. That said, there's also New Testament wine that cannot be poured into Old Testament wineskins (Luke 5:37). This distinction must be carefully discerned, a sacred task that's chronicled throughout the pages of the New Testament. And what are the creeds but gatherings of the most critical affirmations of God-given truth?

When Paul called fellow Christians to be firmly rooted, it had to do with the fact that wherever he went, always following close behind were false teachers. In one way or another, restless people were messing with Gospel truth. We should expect this during the time of the spread of the Gospel. There is an adversary.

We need the living tradition of Christian faith to be passed down. We need to pray for the Holy Spirit, so that we have the wisdom to discern what stands the test of time. There's temptation in both ditches, the agitated innovator whose only allegiance is to the spirit of the times, and the spiritual equivalent of a dusty old museum curator who insists that you must not touch anything, ever. Caricatures, to be sure, but perhaps helpful ones. At the heart of the living tradition is a living faith in the living God, passed down from generation to generation. Once we understand this matter, the rest of today's Scriptures simply pop open.

How did God finally get through to Moses in Exodus 3? What would really catch the attention of the Israelites in their bondage would be verse 6: "And he said, 'I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." God, himself, pointed to their own past, in other words, the living tradition of the intervention of the great "I Am." The people would not have existed if not for the grace and active presence of the Lord. There was a trackrecord in time. Remembering this truth, holding it close to the heart, was essential. It would give them strength to face their struggles, as God had strengthened their ancestors, even calling them into being. Like the burning bush, the living tradition of God's mighty deeds keeps on burning, but never gets burned up (Exodus 3:2). As two of the disciples said after encountering the risen Lord Jesus, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he opened to us the scriptures?" (Luke 24:32).

In the Gospel, the attempt by the Sadducees to trap Jesus represented bad tradition at its worst. Because they only really honored the first five books of the Old Testament, they assumed that there was no teaching on the resurrection of the dead, and therefore no resurrection at all. And didn't they have their positions verified within the history of Israel, going all the way back to Zadok, the faithful priest who stuck by King David during Absalom's rebellion? It was easy for such a position of historic honor to degrade into mere formalism. How shocked they must have been when Jesus out-traditioned them! Since God is Lord of the living, and yet He's Lord of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, how could there not be a resurrection (See Luke 20:-38)?

Oh, how important it is to gather for refreshment in the living truth passed down by the active presence of the Holy Spirit, in the name of the risen Lord Jesus, who is the Alpha and the Omega. Good traditions assist faithfulness, bringing encouragement and wisdom to Christians. We can even use the calendar of the church year to keep certain rhythms and traditions to help us live our lives. These things can be helpful, as long as we remember their limitations.

And when the culture has seemingly gone mad, and some bewildered soul asks you what to do, what do you say? How about this: Well, I can't answer all your questions on the spot, but this I know: Jesus is the risen Lord, who died for our sins. Not only that, but there's a tradition of people gathering, those who want to hear about this, seeking to honor the Lord, and they meet at 9:30 AM each Sunday morning. Furthermore, you are most welcome to join us. And thankful hearts recognize blessings for what they are. Thanks be to God. Amen.



The sons of this age marry and are given in marriage, but those who are considered worthy to attain to that age and to the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage, for they cannot die anymore, because they are equal to angels and are sons of God, being sons of the resurrection. But that the dead are raised, even Moses showed, in the passage about the bush, where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham and the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for all live to him.

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
