

# \*GOSPEL: Matthew 18:21-35

P The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew, the eighteenth chapter:



<sup>21</sup>Peter came up and said to {Jesus}, "Lord, how often will my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" <sup>22</sup>Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy-seven times. <sup>23</sup>Therefore the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his servants. <sup>24</sup>When he began

to settle, one was brought to him who owed him ten thousand talents. <sup>25</sup>And since he could not pay, his master ordered him to be sold, with his wife and children and all that he had, and payment to be made. <sup>26</sup>So the servant fell on his knees, imploring him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' 27And out of pity for him, the master of that servant released him and forgave him the debt. <sup>28</sup>But when that same servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii, and seizing him, he began to choke him, saying, 'Pay what you owe.' 29So his fellow servant fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' <sup>30</sup>He refused and went and put him in prison until he should pay the debt. <sup>31</sup>When his fellow servants saw what had taken place, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their master all that had taken place. 32Then his master summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. 33And should not you have had mercy on your fellow servant, as I had mercy on you?' 34And in anger his master delivered him to the jailers, until he should pay all his debt. 35So also my heavenly Father will do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother from your heart."

Sunday School started today. You are part of God's family. You get to learn about the Bible, stories of God's truth and love, ancestors in the faith, with all that they went through, and all that they celebrated. It's wonderful. Let's pray...

# Houston, we have a solution

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen. Two major points leap off the pages of Scripture this morning:

- 1) There's a kind of "debt" that all of us owe, and it doesn't have to do with money. Recognizing the truth of our own situation helps to clarify where we stand in relation to others.
- 2) Recognition that there's a tremendous source of *forgiveness* for that "debt" brings a level of gratitude that goes beyond mere clarification, on into the realms of transformation.

Seeing everything in the light of the mighty acts of God, understanding the heart and will that's behind those mighty acts, simply brings us to a better place in life. Because of God, we can rise above the troubles that press in so closely, clouding our thoughts. It's like the breath of the Holy Spirit just blows the dark, heavy, choking smog away, allowing us to experience a full breath, light and warmth again. We are here today because all this is possible, by grace.

Understanding the truth of the heavenly perspective, why would we settle for allowing ourselves to be defined by petty squabbles, or even more serious rifts and vendettas, or dare we even imagine a place beyond outright injustice, like what happened to Joseph in Genesis at the hands of his own brothers? We may not be able to help the fact that some of the hard parts of life have surely *affected* us. But God is asking us today about what really *defines* us.

God, through Scripture, lifts us beyond our own perspective, so that we can see what He's actively doing to redeem us and this fallen world. The tricky part involves getting such truth firmly into our hearts and minds.

The biblical context for today's deep realizations takes place amid the honest difficulties associated with human community. Our greatest blessings come because God made us to be relational. In our fallenness, that's also where the greatest challenges reside. As the tempter surely knows, sin curves us in upon

ourselves, only ourselves. Christ calls us to a deep healing, allowing for life together, common worship and mission, voices raised in harmony, gifts used in complementary ways. It's just that sin always lingers near, and what's good can quickly become a burden. So says God's Word for today.

First lesson: Look at Joseph and his brothers. This is real life intensity, radiating across the centuries from the everlasting Word. The theme is universal: human corruption cries out for God's transformation.

Second lesson: It was the time of the early New Testament Church, with a letter written to the congregation in Rome. Yet, even in the time after the Messiah had arrived and the Holy Spirit had been outpoured, St. Paul had to address the difficulty of real people being together. The Spirit was there, but so, too, was the flesh, hanging around until it is completely washed away with the Kingdom's final wave. So, they were not to "quarrel" over matters that only rose to the level of opinion, in other words, matters about which faithful, thoughtful people might legitimately disagree (Rom. 14:1). The implication is that there are matters of higher importance. These must be taken seriously. Just don't treat every cloud like it's a tornado. Faithfulness knows how to make essential distinctions when they appear. And that needs to be our goal. "For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God" (Romans 14:10c). The temptation was to grouch over small stuff, even as lost sheep wandered off into a world of lies, thieves and wolves. What was the New Testament Church up to if not the work of God?

Even so, right in the Gospel for today we find Peter groping around for the absolute furthest limit of human tolerance. Someone was really getting under his skin. "As many as seven times" (Mt. 18:21)? Maybe you can relate.

With all of this said, perhaps there's someone out there who thinks human nature has advanced since Bible times. At the turn of the century, heading into the year 1900, the buzzword on everyone's lips was "progress." With a little scientific understanding and mathematical precision, what can't we accomplish? Give us hard data, scientifically gathered, about the human predicament. Well, I've got some, straight from NASA. And this time when they tell Houston that *they've got a problem*, it's of the human variety.

As you know, space travel has been NASA's mission for a long time. But what must be overcome for this goal to be realized at even further distances? Back in 1990, there was an experiment called Biosphere II. A glass-enclosed dome was erected in the Arizona desert. Eight people signed up to live in it for a significant

amount of time. Even the air, as I understand it, was recycled. I know, it's hard to believe, but everything did not go well. Many plant species died. And by the time the people came stumbling out, several of them weren't even talking to each other.

Fast forward to 2017. Six people would live in isolation together for eight months. (Sounds to me like winter in northern Minnesota.) Anyway, this time NASA built a small, artificial habitat on a Hawaiian volcano. What could possibly go wrong? The goal was to have it look and feel like Mars, for that seems to be their goal. Some of the brightest minds on earth think it's possible, mathematically and scientifically. But there's one obstacle that may be too difficult to overcome. Hm, I wonder what that might be? The 2017 study was centered on getting a better grip on the "psychological impact," the human factor.

Sensors were implanted in the spacesuits the people wore, gathering data about how they were functioning socially and psychologically. They could detect avoidance behavior, and the opposite, when subjects were a little too close, arguing. Stress levels were measured according to their vital signs. Computer programs were loaded with virtual reality "escapes," to see how much this would help. *Hello goggles, take me away to a relaxing place*. The people had to keep daily logs of how they felt. The scientific question was how to handle "inevitable conflict" for the attainment of the overall goal. Sound familiar? I can almost hear my kindergarten teacher encouraging us children to hold hands as we walked across the street to the playground.

NASA's latest experiment just ended in July of this year. Shockingly, they're no longer camping out on a volcano. Instead, they built a tiny, enclosed, high-tech environment in a controlled atmosphere in Houston. It's called HERA—Human Exploration Research Analog—and it simulates a trip to the Martian moon "Phobos." Yes, the word translates into "fear" in English, as in scary. Not sure what to make of that. Anyway, this experiment focused on how crew members would handle "increasing communication delays." If someone wasn't telling them what to do each minute, could they handle it? What if the absence of ground control meant that they had to exercise self-control? It's all quite fascinating (Dec. 21, 2022, "NASA Selects Final Crew for Campaign 6 of Simulated Trip to Mars Moon"; NASA.org. And "NASA Space Psychology Subjects Ending 8 Months of Isolation"; thestream.org, 2017).

To sum up perhaps the greatest obstacle to one of science's greatest achievements, all we need is a mirror. Of course, as we return to our primary objective in church, our Lord's goal for us is to help us right here on earth. In real life, the means of dealing with the more challenging aspects of the human

condition comes through God's Word and actual community, where we are humbled, grounded in honesty about our "debt," and grateful for the gift of forgiveness, which is more precious than anything else in the created universe.

So far, we've had to emphasize the problem, because human nature can deceive itself. But with the problem clearly identified, we can close out the message by pointing to the God-centered power that overcomes even the world.

Remember Joseph and his brothers. Talk about an uncomfortable family reunion! Yet, because one person finally caught sight of the vision of what Almighty God was doing in his life, the entire situation was transformed. And it wasn't that he had to paper over his brothers' intentions. He knew what they were about. It's just that he was even more aware of God's intention. This became his greater focus. Why spend all of one's time gawking at the ugliness of existence, when there's beauty and wonder to behold? As for the brothers, perhaps in their experience of grace they caught a glimpse of something beyond their own manipulations. One can only hope. All because a single person acknowledged the active presence of God.

Everything turned on faith. And this would be true for St. Paul in the second lesson, as well as with Peter, standing before the Lord Jesus in today's Gospel. Which means we're back to the same points with which we began today, awareness of the "debt" we all owe, and openness to the transformation that only forgiveness can provide.

By the way, how much *do* we owe God? Can you pay for the sense of peace that comes with the beauty of a sunset? Can you put a number on the long-awaited hug from a loved one after a difficult time away? What's the monetary worth of a congregation of forgiven sinners singing the praises of God's unshakable faithfulness? We cannot pay back what God has given to us. Yet given it he has.

If my math is correct, the first debtor in Matthew 18 owed the King so much money that if he was a regular laborer, it would have taken 150,000 years. That's some overtime! Unpayable. The King cleared it away, not because the debt wasn't real, but because someone else paid it, in perfect love for the imperfect. Your debt was included. Stare at that fact for a while, and it will begin to transform how you see everything, including those around you. Then genuine Christian mission can be done, together. Thanks be to God. Amen.







NALC Disaster Response Task Force is providing disaster preparedness training at Level One Basic and Level Two Specialized.
