





Turn in the account of your management, for you can no longer be manager.' 3And the manager said to himself, 'What shall I do, since my master is taking the management away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. 4I have decided what to do, so that when I am removed from management, people may receive me into their houses.' 5So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he said to the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' 6He said, 'A hundred measures of oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, and sit down quickly and write fifty.' 7Then he said to another, 'And how much do you owe?' He said, 'A hundred measures of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, and write eighty.' 8The master commended the dishonest manager for his shrewdness. For the sons of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than the sons of light. 9And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of unrighteous wealth, so that when it fails they may receive you into the eternal dwellings. ¹⁰One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much, and one who is dishonest in a very little is also dishonest in much. 11 If then you have not been faithful in the unrighteous wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? ¹²And if you have not been faithful in that which is another's, who will give you that which is your own? ¹³No servant can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be

devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money." ¹⁴The Pharisees, who were lovers of money, heard all these things, and they ridiculed him. ¹⁵And he said to them, "You are those who justify yourselves before men, but God knows your hearts. For what is exalted among men is an abomination in the sight of God."

CHILDREN'S MESSAGE

SERMON: Pastor Dwight Hanson: <u>Tiny Tim</u>

15th Sunday after Pentecost; 9/21/2025; Grace Lutheran Church; Pastor Dwight Hanson Amos 8:4-7; Psalm 113; 1 Timothy 2:1-7; Luke 16:1-15

Children's message: Jesus told the story of a man who didn't trust his boss. So, he cheated and stole from him. Even worse, the boss was trustworthy and only had the man's best interest in mind. Where was the problem? Inside the heart of the dishonest man. When we gather in church, we always ask God to make our hearts clean. If a person stops listening to God, fear and greed can quickly take over. But is that faithful? God provides for our needs. He even sent Jesus so that the blessings last forever. Let's try something: Make a fist with your hand, like you just grabbed something and you want to keep it from everyone else. Now, turn that fist over and open your fingers, like you're receiving a blessing from God. Which one feels better, closed or open? The open hand is also more likely to share, for God gives plenty. Let's pray...

Tiny Tim

Grace to you and peace from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen. When I was a kid, there was one phone for the whole family, permanently attached to the wall. Asking parents for an "unlimited plan" back then would have resulted in an unlimited list of chores. As for TV, we had a few channels, *if* the weather cooperated. Which was ironic, since the main reason for watching TV was to check the weather! Followed by farm market prices, which I never fully understood. Then there was the local sports report, where hopes were always high for a hometown mention.

I do remember that when there were significant happenings in the larger world, Dan Rather or Tom Brokaw made an appearance. They had a half-hour to communicate the essentials. Then, back to the important question: Would there be enough snow for school to be canceled? Inquiring minds wanted to know. As I look back now, the scope of attention was small. Yet, everything felt big.

Today's readings go out of their way to tell us that in a big world, the everlasting God is very aware of <u>little people</u>, easily overlooked or run-over, and <u>little things</u>, where small acts of faithfulness are either lived out or dismissed. "One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much, and one who is dishonest in a very little is also dishonest in much" (Lk. 16:10).

Look at our reading from Amos, chapter 8. God was aware of the abuse of the "poor" and "needy" (vs. 4). Our Psalm shows the Lord stooping down to lift up the "weak," placing them on equal footing with "princes" (Ps. 113:5-7). Score one for the little guys! And just in case there's any question, Jesus put the world on notice when he said that what gets "exalted among men is an abomination in the sight of God" (Lk. 16:15b). So much for most of what passes for glory.

But there's one more example where God makes a big deal of something little—better yet, *someone* little. Many New Testament letters were written to a congregation, or a cluster of them (Gal. 1:2). Our second lesson for today was written by St. Paul to a person, Timothy (1 Tim. 1:1-2). There must be a backstory.

Paul lived a big life, and even, at times, wrote in big letters (Gal. 6:11). But he needed help from someone who operated, for the most part, behind the scenes, just off stage. And that brings us to Timothy. As Paul once put it to the Christians in Philippi, "I hope in the Lord Jesus to send Timothy to you soon, so that I too may be cheered by news of you. For I have no one like him, who will be genuinely concerned for your welfare." "But you know Timothy's proven worth, how as a son with a father he has served with me in the gospel" (Philippians 2:19-20, 22).

Like a father, Paul had to encourage Timothy not to let others despise him because he was young (1 Timothy 4:12). To borrow a phrase: It's not the size of the person in the ministry; it's the size of the ministry in the person! Growing up, maybe Timothy didn't quite know where he stood in the world, with a Jewish mother and a Greek father (Acts 16:1).

Some people just seem to step into the world brimming with confidence. Others find their footing as they grow in faith and life experience. The same truth applies to all: We are little, but God is big. It's the work of the Holy Spirit that builds proper confidence. And it was so, for the heart of young Timothy welcomed the message of Jesus. He was willing to embark on a journey of serving the risen Lord, assisting the Apostle Paul wherever God led them.

Here was this regular person, beloved by God, valuable to Paul, who rendered tremendous service to Christians all over the ancient world, with fruits that have even made their way to us. Oh, how big little can be. Do we not need this very message in an age when only the most extreme spectacle—"Never been seen before!"—has a chance of capturing attention?

Along comes this devoted little fellow, easy to overlook. There's an interesting passage toward the end of First Corinthians. Paul knew that these brothers and sisters, though beloved by God, could be a tough bunch, and could easily fall into judging matters by worldly standards. Timothy was carrying Paul's letter as his representative, and as a servant of the Lord Jesus. Paul, therefore, wrote the following: "When Timothy comes, see that you put him at ease among you, for he is doing the work of the Lord, as I am. So let no one despise him. Help him on his way in peace, that he may return to me…" (1 Cor. 16:10-11a).

A New Testament teacher, based on these words, wondered if Timothy might have been a little bashful, or easy to dismiss, or carried the wounds of other conflicted situations and didn't need more. Not only that, "Paul must underline the fact that Timothy was doing the Lord's work just as much as he (Paul) was" (pg. 650, The Interpreter's Dictionary of the Bible; Vol. 4). Paul wrote the letter. Timothy personally delivered it, passing through a mighty big world. Little services humbly rendered, or big events that draw attention, if they're done for the glory of Jesus, are they not the same in the estimation of the Almighty?

Autumn is a time of bustling activity in the church, many wonderful opportunities. Each one, by itself, might seem rather small. But put it together in the name of Jesus, and then see what you have. What could be smaller than a quilter's stitch? But string them together and they add up to a quilt headed for Disaster Response. A meal carefully prepared and delivered to the shelter, a card thoughtfully sent to someone going through a hard time, a much-need hug or smile, all of it matters in the eyes of God.

And don't forget the prayers! Of course, worldliness has no time for prayerfulness. It scoffs: Why would you waste time asking for God to intervene when you could just impose your will on life? To which faith responds: But remember that we're all quite little, and we don't always know what's best in every situation. We need guidance.

Old Paul knew that one of the first things young Timothy needed to learn was prayer. When you feel overwhelmed, pray. Not just for your needs, but also for the needs of others. And don't forget the thankfulness! Actually count your blessings, and give honor to the source of them. *Hey, I wonder why my blood pressure just went down?* The person going into prayer may not be the same person coming out of it, even if the face in the mirror is familiar—except that what were once worry lines now have a peaceful look.

Shockingly, Paul wanted little Timothy to provide a service to the entire Roman Empire. Did you miss that part? Let me read it again. "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for <u>all people</u>, for <u>kings</u> and all who are in <u>high positions</u>, <u>that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life</u>, godly and dignified in every way" (1 Timothy 2:1-2).

There are times when, in order to have a "peaceful and quiet life," one must ask God's intervention in the hearts and minds of "kings and all who are in high positions." The <u>authority</u> to govern is needed in a fallen world, and is given by

God (see Romans 13:1-7). The <u>ability</u> to do it in such a way that it leads to lives that are "godly and dignified" calls for the influence of the Holy Spirit and the prayers of the people.

But this brings up a question: When First Timothy was written, weren't many emperors and rulers harming Christians? As one scholar put it, "the church in the empire may have been tempted to shield itself from a hostile paganism by withdrawal into itself" (Gealy). Some emperors merely basked in the flattery of being considered a "god." Others went so far as to demand to be worshiped as such.

This is where Christian prayer takes a fascinating turn. Not only is it an act of faithfulness to Jesus, who said to love your enemies *and pray* for those who persecute you (Mt. 5:44), but the act of praying for someone also locates them in the proper place within the grand scheme of things. "In the emperor cult people prayed *to* emperors; for Christians to pray *for* them removed emperors from the savior class and made them, like others, subjects for Christian salvation" (Fred Gealy, pg. 397, The Interpreter's Bible; Vol. 11). In the end, we're all tiny Tim.

Paul's counsel then continues: "This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all, which is the testimony given at the proper time." (1 Timothy 2:3-6).

A few years back, I caught just the end of a televised interview with a fellow who authored a book about how to live a meaningful life. He was taking questions from the audience. A student, overwhelmed by the world, came to the microphone and wondered if there wasn't some way to make a really big difference. Did the author have any advice? Without hesitation, the older man said that the answer is always the same: *If you want to fix the world, begin with yourself*. Everyone laughed, of course, including the author. Then he said that he was being quite serious. What would happen to this troubled world if each person tended to the wellbeing of his or her own heart, mind, and spirit?

In closing, let's remember that our intercessions for others are possible because of the greatest intercession of all, when Jesus came down and "gave himself as a ransom for all" (1 Tim. 2:6). This is our treasure, and it's far from the greedy grasp of the shrewd manager in Luke 16. God, "high above all nations," "stoops" and "lifts up" the lowly (Ps. 113:4-6). And somewhere within every grateful heart, there's a kinship with Timothy of old. Thanks be to God. Amen.

WEEKLY DEVOTIONAL

Fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost (Proper 20) – September 21, 2025

"This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth."

- 1 Timothy 2:3-4 -

Is God Knowable or Mysterious?

A survey asked, "Is God knowable or mysterious?" The problem with this question is that God is not either/or, He is both. We know God because He revealed Himself as He spoke everything into existence. He revealed Himself to Adam and Eve, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, the judges, prophets and kings throughout the ages. He revealed Himself in the Law. He revealed Himself in the deliverance of His people. He revealed Himself through the promises, and then He finally revealed Himself in Jesus Christ.

We know God because He came to dwell among His people. Jesus Christ was the embodiment of the divine in the body of a man. God's character was made manifest as Jesus lived and breathed among mankind. Jesus revealed God's love and mercy and grace as He preached the Good News, healed the sick, and set free those who were bound by all manner of things. We can know God personally, we can even call Him Abba or Daddy, because of Jesus.

Despite being knowable, God is a mystery. He is the Creator of heaven and earth. He is the Deliverer who saved His people. He is the Redeemer who sets His people free. He is living and active in our world, just as He was in the beginning when He brought light out of darkness and order out of chaos. He still creates and recreates His creation and gives us all we need to join Him in the work of His Kingdom.

God saves, but He calls us to share the Gospel with others. God's Word brings peace, but He puts His Word in our mouths. He has promised great things to those He loves and is faithful to us despite our inability to be faithful to Him. He does all the work, but uses water, bread, wine, and people to share His grace with others. The Lord God Almighty is truly a mystery and yet He sent His Son to teach us how to reveal His truth so that everyone will know Him and be saved.
